Dear Family and Friends,

Merry Christmas! It is hard to believe that it's that time of year again – time has been flying by so quickly. As we contemplate the last year and a half of marriage, we realize how much has transpired and how truly blessed we are. Since we did not send out a letter last Christmas, there is much to share! Let me start at the beginning...



As you know, we wed in July 2003, on one of the hottest, most humid days known to upstate New York. After a brief trip to the Delaware Water Gap, we loaded up a U-Haul and prepared to drive my things to Illinois. Instead, we just enjoyed time with Larry's Mom and his brother's family, who all live in South Carolina. We learned that "popcorn" is pronounced "popeone" in "Southern." We had a great time! This Christmas we are planning to fly to New York to see my family and friends for the first time since we got married. We're planning a whirlwind tour, including visits to Endwell, New York City, and Albany. We are praying for better weather this time around!

During all of the moving and running and traveling, Larry resumed taking classes from Penn State in order to finish his Masters in Education that he began many years ago. We found out "just in time" that the requirements would be changing at the end of this school year, so it was now or never for finishing. We were elated to find out that he could take his remaining classes through distance ed., since it really wouldn't have been possible to move to PA for a year. To date, Larry has finished two classes and has one to go. He will graduate in May 2005, just in time to embark on yet another life adventure...read on!

Many of you know about our deep interest in China and all things Chinese. Well, we have been given the opportunity to lead a group of college students on a Christian summer cultural exchange trip through a partnership with Leadership Development International (LDI).
